Dear Friends,

Spirit is a word that is very hard to define, especially in a church context. We know the Holy Spirit as the Third Person of the Trinity – the way we speak of God, but beyond that, discussion is hard. The *Prayer Book* describes the Holy Spirit as "God at work in the world and in the church" – the Spirit of Christ bringing us "into love and harmony with God, with ourselves, with our neighbors and with all creation." Still, recognizing the Spirit at work can be complicated.

I thought about this last Sunday at an Annual Meeting that can truly be said to have been "spirit filled." One person after another, one report after another, poured out warmth and good will, positive feelings and evidence that God's Spirit is most definitely alive and well in this place.

In my own report, given as part of the sermon that morning, I quoted what Lauren DiSarno wrote in her "Family Life Report." She said, "Family life was in full swing again this year [2014], with events to bring the entire parish family together. Family life plays an important role at All Saints' Church by strengthening the bonds between us." So many people have worked to make that happen, and they've been inspired by the Spirit – known or unknown.

When parishioners share stories of how they first came here, there is often some mystery involved. Why did they happen to walk in for the first time on a particular day? Why did they drive the car into the parking lot after years of just driving by? Why did they suddenly notice a sign advertising some special event and decide to come to it? The answer is most definitely a mystery – the mysterious work of the Holy Spirit getting involved in our lives.

From Family Suppers to the Martin Luther King Day of Service, from the Sunday Morning Conversation, to Thursday night Choir rehearsals, from the website to a growing number of "likes" on our FaceBook page, from the Food Pantry to the Gardeners, from Coffee Hour Hospitality to Stewardship – all this and more reflects the Holy Spirit busily at work.

Yes, "Spirit" is a word that is very hard to define. But you know it when you see it, and happily you can see the Spirit here at All Saints'.

SCRIPTURE SHARING, FEBRUARY 3

Take part in an informal gathering to talk over the Scripture lessons assigned for the following Sunday. The discussion on Tuesday, Feb. 3, will cover the lessons for February 8 (Epiphany 5, Year B). which include Isaiah 40:21-31, 1 Corinthians 9:16-23, and Mark 1:29-39. ASH WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 18

Ash Wednesday is the official beginning of Lent, the penitential season of forty days that ends on Easter. Sundays are not counted in the forty days, but Lent does include Holy week. This is traditionally a time of preparation -- preparing ourselves spiritually so that we can more fully understand and experience the joy of Easter – God's gift of grace in Jesus' resurrection.

People often give up something for Lent, or instead, they may take on some useful activity, all to make the season more meaningful by having it feel different. Church looks different with purple hangings and greens instead of flowers on the altar. Also, we do not sing or say, "alleluia."

On Ash Wednesday, All Saints' has two worship services – 9 am and 8 pm. Both follow the Ash Wednesday Liturgy, and ashes are imposed at both. The All Saints' Choir will sing at the evening service. Try to begin Lent with worship – here if possible, elsewhere if that works out.

SHROVE TUESDAY PANCAKE SUPPER, FEBRUARY 17

Enjoy our traditional Pancake Supper on the eve of Lent. Rich food is traditionally served on Shrove Tuesday in order to use up the kinds of things that one might choose to give up during the penitential season that follows. Come and share pancakes with butter and syrup, sausage, applesauce, and beverages (coffee, tea and soft drinks).

The cost is \$5 for an adult and \$2 for a child age 10 and under, with a \$15 maximum for a family. We invite you to come any time between 6:30 and 8:00 pm. Please call the church to reserve a place or sign up in Lea Hall. To help with the pancakes, speak to **Kevin Walsh**.

ANNUAL MEETING

In an hour-and-a-half or so, the Annual Report was covered, as chairs of the different committees and guilds came forward to elaborate on the printed material and take questions. The final Budget for 2014 and the Budget for 2015 were presented by Treasurer John Brewer, and his reports were accepted. There are financial unknowns tied in with the rector's retirement as of June 1st, and future meetings with representatives of the Diocese will help fill in the blanks. Tom Loop gave the Endowment Report – thankfully, a very good year. His report was accepted.

Richard Johnson was elected to his second term as Warden. For Diocesan Convention, Delegates are John Brewer, Richard Johnson and Don Kern. Alternates are Charlie Beakes and Susan Winkler.
