#### Dear Friends,

The tragic bombings at the Boston Marathon reminded us once again that we live with dangers unforeseen not so long ago. We face actual events that used to be the stuff of horror movies and science fiction. But there have now been two decades of terrorist activities in this country. The first World Trade Center bombing was twenty years ago, followed in fairly quick succession by Oklahoma City, Columbine, then September 11<sup>th</sup> and too much since then. As a result, we have had to acknowledge that the world has changed,

After all this, it seems time to restate a basic truth – God does not cause such tragic events to happen. In no way does God ever, for any reason, cause bad things to happen, not to punish, teach, test – not for anything. We do not know why tragedy strikes, and the standard answer we fall back on, free will, is not very satisfying. But there it is. God grants humans free will, so we have the freedom to make choices, and unfortunately, not all choices will be good ones.

On the Sunday after the bombing, I quoted from Harold Kushner's book about the 23<sup>rd</sup> Psalm (which happened to be the psalm appointed for that day). The book is called, *The Lord is My Shepherd*, and I share a few of his thoughts here because they are so beautifully stated and potentially helpful. "God's role," wrote Kushner, "is not to protect us from pain and loss, but to protect us from letting pain and loss define our lives."

And this..."We will hurt, but we will heal. We will grieve, but we will grow whole again. Even as the flock needs the shepherd because there are wolves in the world, we will find the world a less frightening and more livable place because, 'Thou art with me.'"

May God be with us.

# -- Parishioner Profile --

### FROM OUR CONFIRMANDS

This month's newsletter offers brief reflections from the five young parishioners being Confirmed on June 1<sup>st</sup>. They were asked to write brief essays addressing, "What Confirmation Means to Me" or "Why I Want to Be Confirmed"

#### Anthony Dada

Confirmation helps me grow from being a child into an adult, and it allows me to work with other children my age at church. I was baptized when I was a 1-year-old baby. I do not really remember what happened to me when my mother took me to church to be baptized. This time, at Confirmation, I'm aware more of what being a Christian means. Confirmation will make me closer to God. A few Sundays a month, I attended Confirmation classes where I learned how the church was started and how it works. I was able to visit Grace's Kitchen in Plainfield, NJ and I helped serve meals to people in need. I now understand better the different parts of the church service on Sundays. Finally, I look forward to meeting Bishop Councell.

#### Daniel Dawson

Back in September I began attending Confirmation classes. We have gone over topics such as: baptism, prayer, the Sacraments, Faith, the Trinity, worshiping God, and other facts about church. Confirmation is growing up in the church. I will be making a commitment to Christ. That means that I will follow through on being a good person, worshiping in church and loving Jesus. I try to be a good person every day. I know that if I mess up, I can ask God for forgiveness. I always try to learn from my mistakes so I can be a better person. Confirmation is me taking on the responsibility to follow the Ten Commandments. I know that it will be a special day for me and my family.

#### Nathaniel Harris

Confirmation is important to me, because it is a milestone for maturity in one's life. There is the notion of moving ahead in the church community and being looked upon more as an adult, but, more important is what Confirmation means for one's self. As an opportunity for reflection, it helps one realize what he or she has done and how one has matured over the course of one's life. To me, Confirmation readies me to take on more responsibilities. It is a time when you start to take on a bigger role in the church community, interact with that community, and do more in the adult life of the church. In my life it has taken me time to become serious about things, but of the many activities I partake in life, church is an area I now take much more seriously. I have started paying much closer attention to the services that I go to, and I have found that church is more than just a place where you get free food after the service. When I joined the acolyting ministry, I learned that you can benefit from listening because the lessons we learn in church

apply to our lives. I think that being confirmed marks this step in my maturity. It is a milestone that I am prepared for and one that I am ready to build from.

#### Aubrey Johnson

Thirteen years ago I was baptized, something I had no choice in. Now I am about to be confirmed which, to me, means confirming my beliefs, renewing my faith, and truly becoming Episcopalian. This is a conscious decision, which I feel I am ready to make. I want to be confirmed because I want to know I chose to be an Episcopalian instead of being born into this religion. Also I want to become a part of my church and become closer to God. Other good things will probably come out of being confirmed later on, but for now I think it is a decision I will not regret making.

To me, getting confirmed is something that could help me later on. For example, it could be when I miraculously survive in a game even though I should have died, or when I find a mysterious five-dollar bill on the ground and I have someone to thank. Yet there is another reason that stood out the most to me. It's because I know when I walk alone in my own path, someone will be there to guide me. Not only can they be my mentor, but they will be there for the rest of my life. They will tell me what to do by making certain things occur that could mean my actions are correct or wrong. However, some things need to happen. For example, Hurricane Sandy happened in the month of October. I unfortunately, lost power for twelve days and a lot of trees were knocked down like a stack of dominoes. I was like many others who lost power and the less fortunate even lost their homes and prized possessions. It is not our call to say what's right and wrong. It is God's because he knows all. Thank you.

We are pleased to welcome them into the Episcopal Church, and especially as communicants of All Saints'.
