Advent Scripture readings are filled with warnings about being prepared. For now, Advent marks the end of one year and the beginning of another, but one day, there will be a final ending when Christ the King returns and the Kingdom of God is established.

As Jesus says in Matthew 24:36-44, "Keep awake, for you do not know on what day your Lord is coming. But...if the owner of the house had known in what part of the night the thief was coming, he would have stayed awake and would not have let his house be broken into."

We have much to be grateful for – for example, getting together to enjoy fellowship and celebrate God's presence among us as we did on All Saints' Sunday, at worship in Lea Hall!

BUEN CAMINO

People tell me I'm crazy and I might be, but that's a completely separate issue. I think it's crazy to go on vacation and sit by a pool or lay on a beach. I want to be doing something! To me there's no better way to spend any vacation than trekking. Whether in a big city, or in the mountains, or in the middle of nowhere, from your first step you're on an adventure. And while you may have a destination in mind, there's no way to predict what or who you will encounter along the way. With that in mind, the Camino de Santiago, the way of Saint James, or shortly put, The Way, sounded like a perfect vacation.

People have been on pilgrimage along the way of St. James for more than a thousand years. More accurately, there is more than one "way," as there are more than a dozen recognized paths throughout Spain. Where and how you begin your pilgrimage and which path you choose depends on you, but the destination is always the cathedral in Santiago, Spain where the relics of St James lay.

The path I chose was the Camino Frances, or the French route. Beginning in St. John de Pied de Port, France and crossing over the Pyrenees, across the plains of northern Spain to the city of Santiago, it is the most popular route. The route is about 500 miles and usually takes about 33 days to complete. Having only two weeks to dedicate to it, and wanting to complete the final 100 kilometers to qualify for my *Compestella* (the document issued by the Catholic Church declaring me an official pilgrim), I had to take advantage of some modern transportation which was not available to the early pilgrims.

I started walking with my friend Pete, but he got sick and went home after three days. After he left, I met another friend in Leon, and we walked together, as well as with people we met. I can't say that it was any more than a walk in the beginning, but there is certainly an underlying feeling of spirituality to it. As the days and miles went by, together with the people I met, there was a growing camaraderie and a common bond.

When all the miles were totaled, I found I had walked over 220 miles in twelve days. I spent time in a few beautiful cites including Pamplona, Leon, Astorga, Ponferrada and Santiago. I walked through fields, across streams and rivers, along highways, through forests, over the Pyrenees, through alleys, tunnels and city squares. I walked through rain and fog and snow and hail. I sipped *café con leche* in dozens of cafes and had my share of *vino tinto*. I met dozens of fellow pilgrims from all over the world. We shared meals, hysterical stories, dormitory sleeping

quarters and epic symphonies of snoring. Everyone was there for a different reason, and no one left unaffected.

It's very hard to describe the feeling of walking into the square in front of the cathedral and then climbing the steps to get my *Compestella*. Along with the feeling of accomplishment, I was amongst hundreds of people sharing similar feelings. For some time I watched people arrive and witnessed their joy. I watched people greet other pilgrims that they had walked with weeks earlier and hadn't seen again until just then. It's really quite a site in the square, from people snapping pictures, to getting addresses, to telling stories or reliving a funny situation, or just sitting staring at the cathedral. I remember the feeling of not wanting to leave the square, and I went back there many times to just sit and think. What I thought then is what I think now, in trekking as in life, the journey is the destination.

For the next few days in Santiago, I had a general feeling of lightness. A little of this was from not having to get up at 6:00 in the morning and walk twenty miles, a little from not having to carry all of my belongings everywhere, and some probably because I actually did it! I plan on doing it again someday, and next time I'll walk the whole Camino.

I know it's not a trip for everyone, but for the life of me I can't think of why not!
