Dear Friends,

Much as I love the summer and hate to see it end, this time of year is exhilarating. There is a great sense of potential, as we enter the parish's new program year.

Several planning meetings held at the end of August and the beginning of September dealt with our education programs for both children and adults. The meetings were noteworthy for their wealth of new ideas and genuine enthusiasm. It was also heartening to look around and see a mix of long-time parishioners and newer arrivals -- working together, mulling over one another's suggestions, and forging friendships.

This is an example of taking to heart what the Gospel for September 1^{st} was about. In Luke, chapter 14, Jesus talks about welcoming people. He starts out mildly enough, advising against rushing to claim a place of honor at a dinner party, because some more noteworthy person might be placed there. Then he cautions against inviting people with some ulterior motive – such as getting something from them in return. But the crux of his message has to do with making sure that the door is wide open and the invitation is genuine and broad. These days, that is called issuing a "radical welcome." It is what Jesus promises Peter the fisherman when he calls him to put down his nets and follow him. Jesus promises that Peter will be "fishing for people."

This is part of the legacy of The Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, the anniversary of whose "I Have a Dream" speech we celebrated on the first Sunday in September. Part of his dream from August 28, 1963 has to do with inclusion – all people being welcomed, respected, and perceived as brothers and sisters in Christ. That is part of our stated mission as a parish, to be "a growing Christian community that welcomes, nurtures and nourishes people of varied cultures, backgrounds and ages." Join us – the door is open!

HOW ALL SAINTS' BECAME MY CHURCH HOME

When I was asked to write something for the newsletter, my immediate thought was: what can I say? I continued to try to think of a topic and decided to write about my religious journey from childhood to the present. I am not a "cradle Episcopalian." However, I have been an Episcopalian for over forty years.

Most of my immediate and extended family attend Baptist or Methodist churches. Only my sister and I deviated from family religious tradition. She and I were baptized as children in the Baptist Church in South Carolina. At an early age, my parents moved to Newark, New Jersey where we attended Sunday School at Bethany Baptist Church.

During the 1960s, the Roman Catholic Church began to sponsor numerous activities for young people. Many of my friends became Roman Catholics. I liked the ritual associated with the Catholic worship service and eventually began to attend catechism classes at St. Mary's Church in Newark. The more I learned, the less sure I became that Roman Catholicism was for me. I stopped going to confirmation classes and worshiped at several Baptist churches on a sporadic basis. Something was missing. For me, the liturgy was a big deal. I missed that.

During my late teens, I began to attend Saint Phillip's Episcopal Church in Newark where my sister and I eventually became confirmed as Episcopalians. She remained a parishioner there until her death. My husband, Frank, and I were married in St. Phillip's Church on May 24, 1963. We moved to East Orange, and sometimes attended a nearby Episcopal church in Orange. Saint Phillip's Church was destroyed by fire in the early 1960s, and the parish merged with Trinity Cathedral. Our son and daughter were baptized at Trinity Cathedral. I knew many of the parishioners and felt at home there.

We moved to Scotch Plains in 1970. Traveling to Newark on Sundays with two young children for Sunday School and church services was a hassle. It became apparent that we should try to find a church home closer to where we lived. We also felt that it was important for our children to have roots in their community. Father Nielson visited us and invited us to visit All Saints' Church. We did, and shortly thereafter formally transferred our membership to All Saints'. I remember being welcomed by parishioners such as Olga Yurchuk and Ruth and Henry Brock. We met other families and became involved in church activities. Although I loved All Saints' Church, in my heart, Trinity Cathedral was still my church home.

As our children became older teens and young adults, they stopped attending church on a regular basis. I found myself attending Trinity Cathedral more often with my sister. We had a tradition of attending Palm Sunday service at Trinity Cathedral. When my sister passed away, I stopped attending services at the Cathedral and began to attend All Saints' more regularly. Reverend Jane was a very welcoming presence.

Over the years, the faces and families at All Saints' had changed somewhat and I did not know many of the active parishioners because I mostly attended the 8 o'clock service. I started to attend the 10 o'clock service more often, reconnected with old parishioners and met new ones. When Reverend Jane invited me to become a Lay Reader, I was hesitant at first, but I am glad that I accepted the invitation. I have found that All Saints' is still a welcoming community. I know many more people by name and recognize faces -- when I have a senior moment.

When I enter All Saints' Church now, I truly feel at home.
